48 (*Effective from passage*):

52 30, 2021, and such funds shall be transferred and made available as

56 Board and Care for Children-Foster, (4) Legislative Management, for
57 Personal Services, (5) the Department of Administrative Services, for

59 Services, (7) the Department of Developmental Services, for Personal
60 Services, (8) the Department of Developmental Services, for Behavioral
61 Services Program, (9) the Office of Early Childhood, for Early Care and
62 Education, (10) the Department of Education, for Magnet Schools, (11)
63 the Department of Social Services, for Connecticut Home Care Program,
64 (12) the Department of Social Services, for Temporary Family
65 Assistance-TANF, (13) the Department of Social Services, for Aid To
66 The Disabled, (14) the Teachers' Retirement Board, for Retirees Health
67 Service Cost, (15) the State Comptroller-Fringe Benefits, for Higher
68 Education Alternative Retirement System, (16) the Department of Public
69 Health, for Personal Services, (17) the Department of Social Services, for
70 HUSKY B Program, (18) the Department of Social Services, for Old Age
71 Assistance, (19) the Department of Social Services, for State
72 Administered General Assistance, (20) the Department of Children and
73 Families, for Board and Care for Children-Short-term and Residential,

74 (21) the Judicial Department, for Personal Services, and (22) the State
75 Comptroller-Fringe Benefits, for Retired State Employees Health
76 Service Cost.

77 (b) (1) Up to \$1,500,000 to the Department of Social Services, for
78 Medicaid, for each of the fiscal years ending June 30, 2022, and June 30,
79 2023, to fund the state share of an increase in the personal needs
80 allowance to seventy-five dollars;

81 (2) (A) Up to \$2,000,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022, and
82 up to \$21,700,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2023, to the Office of
83 Policy and Management, for Private Providers, for costs associated with
84 a settlement between the state and Department of Developmental
85 Services' contracted providers; and

86 (B) Up to \$13,150,000 to the Office of Policy and Management, for
87 Private Providers, for each of the fiscal years ending June 30, 2022, and
88 June 30, 2023, for private providers of human services to provide a cost-
89 of-living adjustment (COLA) to [employees who provide] state
90 administered human services in the Departments of Correction,
91 Housing, Public Health, Social Services, Children and Families, Aging
92 and Disability Services, Mental Health and Addiction Services, the
93 Office of Early Childhood and the Judicial Department. The secretary
94 shall transfer such funds to the affected contracting agencies. Not later
95 than January 1, 2022, July 1, 2022, January 1, 2023, and July 1, 2023, the
96 Secretary of the Office of Policy and Management shall report, in
97 accordance with section 11-4a of the general statutes, to the joint
98 standing committee of the General Assembly having cognizance of
99 matters relating to appropriations and the budgets of state agencies, on
100 the amount of such funds paid to each contracted provider by
101 contracting agency and account;

110 Connecticut State Colleges and Universities, for Debt Free Community
111 College;

112 (B) Up to \$21,332,962 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022, and up
113 to \$22,165,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2023, to the Connecticut
114 State Colleges and Universities, for Community Tech College System;

115 (C) Up to \$22,568,668 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022, and up
116 to \$25,150,479 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2023, to the Connecticut
117 State Colleges and Universities, for Connecticut State University;

118 (D) Up to \$889,254 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022, and up to
119 \$988,447 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2023, to the Connecticut State
120 Colleges and Universities, for Charter Oak State College; and

121 (E) Up to \$140,000 to the Connecticut State Colleges and Universities,
122 for Charter Oak State College, for each of the fiscal years ending June
123 30, 2022, and June 30, 2023, for the costs associated with the waiver of
124 graduation fees; [and]

125 [(F) Notwithstanding any provision of the general statutes, any
126 amount transferred pursuant to this subdivision shall not be eligible for
127 fringe benefit recovery by The Connecticut State Colleges and
128 Universities from the Comptroller's General Fund fringe benefit
129 accounts.]

130 (6) (A) Up to \$6,087,251 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2023, to The
131 University of Connecticut, for Operating Expenses;

132 (B) Up to \$4,900,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022, and up

141 Expenses, for the purposes of the Connecticut Institute for Resilience &

143 [(E) Notwithstanding any provision of the general statutes, any
