Take in the world-class collection at Yale Art Gallery, explore experimental contemporary art at ArtSpace or attend the International Festival of Arts & Ideas, a 15-day annual festival that brings thousands together each summer for performances and dialogue with great artists and thinkers from across the world.

Take a leisurely drive north along the Connecticut River to East **Haddam** to take in a musical at the Tony award winning Goodspeed.

Take in a show at **Hartford Stage** or TheaterWorks where you'll find live theater of the highest quality in intimate settings.
